



Whale spotted in central London

A seven-tonne whale has made its way up the Thames to central London, where it is being watched by riverside crowds.

The 16-18ft (5m) northern bottle-nosed whale, which is usually found in deep sea waters, has been seen as far upstream as Chelsea.

A rescue boat has been sent to protect the whale and rescuers have been trying to keep it away from the river banks.

Specialist equipment, including inflatable tubes to re-direct the animal downstream, are being sent.

The whale has come within yards of the banks and has crashed into an empty boat causing slight bleeding.





Review of CCO's worldwide




The information contained in this chapter is presented in sections.

This section is a global overview, presenting data from all 96 participating Cetacean Conservation Organisations (CCOs).

The subsequent sections break down the data by region. Regions are listed in order, starting with the region with the highest number of CCOs as follows:

- 1 Europe
- 2 North America
- 3 Central / South America and the Caribbean
- 4 Oceania
- 5 Africa
- 6 Asia

We identified a potential 191 CCOs, of which 45 did not respond to our survey, 23 were either not eligible or we could not determine eligibility, and a further 29 either no longer exist or we could not determine their existence. Ninety six CCOs completed questionnaires for inclusion in this project.

Of the 96 organisations who responded to our survey, ten requested to be listed on the Planet Whale website but not to be included in the report. One further CCO is included in this review but not in the directory.

This review summarises the information provided by 96 CCOs in 32 countries around the world.







































► WHAT DO GOVERNMENTS DO?

- CMS and ASCOBANS Member States have passed a number of resolutions on bycatch mitigation.
- The ASCOBANS Advisory Committee and CMS Scientific Council provide guidance and seek to engage actively with the industry.

UNEP/CMS Resolution 10.14: Bycatch of CMS-listed Species in Gilnet Fisheries

- requests Parties to assess the risk of gillnet fisheries in their territorial waters and to identify and improve mitigation measures.
- instructs the CMS Scientific Council to review mitigation techniques regularly with regard to their effectiveness and impacts on other species.

OVERTHINKING

- 1 Threatens the long-term viability of fisheries important for humans.
- 2 Causes food shortages for marine predators due to prey depletion or removal of fish species such as herring that drive prey species to the surface where they become available to other marine predators.
- 3 Forces predators to feed on less nutritious species or to spend more energy in search of prey, affecting their fitness and reproductive success.
- 4 Destabilizes food webs and the species composition, and may result in collapsing ecosystems.
